The Sero Project

Sero is a network organization that centers the leadership of PLHIV (including staff) to end HIV criminalization, mass incarceration, racism and social injustice by supporting inclusive PLHIV networks to improve policy outcomes, advance human rights and promote healing justice.





HIV Criminalization

The unjust use of outdated criminal laws, policies and practices to punish people living with HIV (PLHIV), based on one's HIV status.

These laws and the practice of criminalizing HIV is a racial, gender, and economic justice issue.

- •Studies from the Williams Institute show that HIV criminalization is disproportionately used to target Black, Indigenous, and other people of color, especially those who are also cis and trans women, gay and bisexual men, people who use drugs, sex workers, and immigrants
- Criminalization increases risk of violence for women living with HIV
- •Incarceration and criminal records have lifelong effects on ability to exercise rights and access support systems including mental health to address the trauma

HIV Criminalization in the United States

States that may require **registration** as a sex offender as part of the punishment under HIV-specific laws



5 Things You Should Know About HIV Criminalization:

- 1. Criminalization laws don't work as intended
- 2. Criminalization laws don't support public health
- 3. Criminalization laws don't align w/ current science
- 4. Criminalization laws <u>don't</u> decrease stigma & discrimination
- 5. Criminalization laws <u>don't</u> make sense for the justice system

HIV Criminalization in Florida

It is a third degree <u>felony</u>, punishable by up to <u>five</u> years in prison and/or a <u>\$5,000 fine</u>, if a person living with HIV:

- 1. Knows that they are HIV positive and
- 2. Have been informed that HIV may be transmitted during sexual intercourse; and
- 3. Has sexual intercourse with any other person without disclosing their HIV status.





But also...

Other sexually transmitted diseases are not treated criminally on the same scale as HIV.

It is a first degree misdemeanor punishable by up to three years in prison and/or a \$1,000 fine, if a person living with STD:

- 1. Knows that they have an STD;
- 2.Has been informed that STD <u>may be transmitted during sexual intercourse</u>; and
- 3. Has sexual intercourse with any other person without disclosing their status.



How do PLHIV Protect Themselves

There's no strategy that's ideal or fool-proof, but the following can give peace of mind to a PLHIV navigating disclosure to their partner:

- Disclosure agreement form/contract
- Email & Social Media Interactions Screenshot! Print! Send to trust source!
- •Introduce your Provider to your Partner**
- Witnesses
- •Document!

...this is not official legal advice, please consult an attorney if facing HIV criminalization





How do PLHIV protect themselves

If you have a client/patient that has been accused of an HIV related crime, please advise them to NOT TALK TO police or investigators.

TELL THEM TO ASK FOR A LAWYER.

Acknowledging many do not have access to an attorney and public defenders are limited in education on HIV.

- Do not acknowledge your HIV status
- •Do not provide blood, saliva, or give permission for any medical tests
- Do not sign any documents
- Do not volunteer any information

FIND A LAWYER through Lambda Legal, ACLU, SERO or another HIV friendly trusted source

Implement a Community ASSURANCE plan
