Ending the HIV Epidemic

HIV Prevalence Rate Ratios, by Race/Ethnicity, 2020







The rate of **Black males** living with an HIV diagnosis is 5.4 times that of **White males**.

The rate of **Hispanic/Latino males** living with an HIV diagnosis is 2.3 times that of **White males**.







The rate of **Black females** living with an HIV diagnosis is 14.2 times that of **White females**.

The rate of **Hispanic/Latina females** living with an HIV diagnosis is 2.8 times that of **White females**.






ABSTRACT

Nurse practitioners (NPs) across specialties are positioned to lead in human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) prevention and care, particularly for Black women, a demographic that continues to be disproportionately burdened by the HIV/AIDS epidemic. This article serves as a call to action to critically examine and challenge the prevailing risk-centric framework that has traditionally guided HIV assessment and prevention strategies. We propose a shift from a risk-centric framework to one that is reason centric and rooted in equitable and holistic sexual health care. This paradigmatic shift is critical to improving HIV prevention strategies and fostering better patient-provider communication.



Stylists Post-Training (n=19)

"Great conversations, I learned a lot. Being comfortable with open conversation was the best"

- Moderate to high levels of medical mistrust.
- High knowledge scores.
- Moderate attitudes toward HIV's larger impact on the community.
- High to very high commitment to advocacy
- High willingness to serve as opinion leader

"She [trainer] was transparent.
Myths busted. I gained
knowledge and confidence."

"It was easy, straightforward, and informative. It was broken down in laymen terms and anyone would understand the importance to take care of yourself and ways to prevent HIV."



Lessons Learned

- Black women want to be engaged in conversations about sexual health
- Edutainment videos well received. Timing, production, and delivery are important.
- PrEP navigation in this community may need alternative
- Academic and community partnerships
- Reframe risk messaging

Next Steps

- Sustainability and scalability of the stylist training across the US south
- Use feedback to make minor changes to videos.
- Consider other methods of PrEP access
- Policy and procedures
- Engage providers in reward-based messaging



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
